It's in our midst, but for many people, it's still elusive. Signs of its existence are out there. Its habitat is in a neighborhood just like those in which we live. Once found, though, Audubon Center for Birds of Prey in Maitland promises education, fun, beauty, and an awareness about nature and conservation that will ensure your first visit is not your last.

"We have neighbors who have said they've never been here," says Katie Warner, center director, a Florida native who has worked with the Audubon Society for 16 years. "We work really hard in the community with programs in Central Florida to share our message."

On the shores of Lake Sybelia, the park-like setting of the Birds of Prey center property is the first thing you notice after making your way through its gate. Shady pathways are lined with trees, plants, aviaries, and informative signs about raptor inhabitants. And the center's laid-back vibe and lack of crowds gives its visitors time to tour the area at their leisure.

Admission is just \$8 for adults, and it's a great way to spend an afternoon. You can bring lunch and sit by the lake on the property to eat, says Katie. And there is something for everyone, whether you're a bird watcher, nature lover, outdoor enthusiast, history buff, or biology fan.



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
