


**STATE** of the Lakes

**MAITLAND**

Our lakes are in *great* shape. Have a look:



In 1996, the very first Stormwater Lakes Management Plan (SLMP) was published. The SLMP documents water-quality trends in Maitland's lakes and provides guidance on programs and infrastructure to improve the quality of lakes.

Nitrogen, phosphorus, chlorophyll, and clarity of each lake is measured. The data is plugged into a formula and derives the **Trophic State Index (TSI)**. **The lower the value, the better the quality of the lake.** There are four trophic states: oligotrophic (below 50), mesotrophic (50 - 61), eutrophic (61 - 70), and hypereutrophic (greater than 70).

For example, in 1993, Lake Lily was hypereutrophic with a TSI value of 71. Fast forward 22 years, and Lake Lily's TSI value is 40 -- a dramatic difference -- and none of Maitland's lakes are eutrophic or hypereutrophic. **Celebrating 20 Years of Proactive Lake Management**

The City remains committed to its lakes. Retention ponds, nutrient-separating baffle boxes, stormwater collection systems, and drainage improvements have positively impacted the quality of Maitland's lakes. Created in 2008, the Stormwater Environmental Utility Special Revenue Fund funds these important lakes projects.




*How Can I Help Protect Our Great Lakes?*

Clean up - and properly dispose of - pet waste




Avoid or reduce use of pesticides and fertilizers

## RIDE UBER & Claim a Discount

The City Council approved a pilot project through an agreement with Uber and the Municipal Mobility Working Group comprised of Maitland, Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary, Longwood, and Sanford.

Uber is a ridesharing transportation network where users can use a smartphone app to request a ride. The app pinpoints Uber cars on a map in the vicinity of the pick-up location and sends a car to provide a ride to the requestor.

The pilot program began on July 1. The City pays 20 percent of fares for Uber trips that begin and end in Maitland city limits. Similarly, the City pays 25 percent of fares for Uber trips starting or ending at the Maitland SunRail Station. The rider discount cap is \$5 within Maitland proper and \$6.25 with a stop involving the Maitland SunRail Station. Type promo code **MAITLAND** into the app to claim the discount, and it will be automatically deducted from your Uber fee.

**MAITLAND CITY CENTRE:** On June 6, 2016, the developers of Maitland City Centre hosted a community groundbreaking ceremony. Once built, expected tenants include: Starbucks, Subway, Renaissance Med Spa, and Nava Pets. Five additional tenants are expected to call Maitland City Centre home: an artisanal market, an authentic Mexican restaurant, a salad and wrap restaurant, a casual American restaurant and bar, and a New York-style delicatessen.

**QUIET ZONE UPDATE:** Quiet Zones are portions of train track where trains approaching crossings are not required to sound train horns. Quiet Zone railroad crossings need to be equipped with improvements, such as four-quadrant gates with median separators, before the designation is recognized. The Florida Department of Transportation is negotiating costs for labor, supplies, and materials.
